Military Escalates Attacks on Christian Kachin in Burma (Myanmarr): Despite having won Burma's 8 November polls in a landslide, Aung San Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy will face major hurdles. The deeply flawed 2008 constitution centralises government and contains 'exception clauses' that give the military the legal right to orchestrate a coup if the military deems it necessary. Today, two military-run conglomerates continue to dominate much of Burma's economy. The conflict in Kachin State continues because the Kachin - a devoutly Christian people - want greater autonomy with cultural and religious freedom, while the military wants to exploit Kachin lands, which are rich in jade, timber and water for hydro-electricity. The extreme violence meted out by the Buddhist Burmese military to the Christian Kachin is driven by greed and racial and religious hatred.

Mennonites Persecuted in Vietnam: On 9 June, the students of a Mennonite Bible School in South Vietnam were woken by 300 plain-clothe police at 11pm for an 'administrative search'. The 76 Christians present were brutally assaulted and detained overnight. Twenty students needed medical attention. The same happened the following three nights. This is to intimidate a church group whose leader, Rev Nguyen Hong Quang, is an outspoken advocate for religious freedom. Raids and persecution have continued, utilities have been cut off and phones and motorbikes confiscated. Fifty-two students and leaders including Pastor Quang were summoned to be interrogated. On 12 June the Mennonite leaders protested officially about the abuse. A nearby Catholic church has agreed to provide refuge for Mennonite victims of persecution if needed. May the Lord protect and preserve them all.



Kenya Again? Yes Definitely!

Hi Friends,

Yes it is true that we are off again to Kenya this year (whilst we are able) to share with the wonderful Kenyan people and assist where possible.

We depart in mid March and spend one month at Cherish Exchange Foundation in Nakuru Kenya. We will of course also visit our friend Pastor William, staff and children of Kerry Children Bible Ministry in Nakuru. However, we usually don't take money for projects there, even though they are very needy, simply because we can't do everything!

We will finally spend one month at that wonderful place Kivuli Project in the small town of Ndaragwa.

Money: Yes we need money again this year to pay for Projects. Some of these include:-

For Cherish

- raising \$11,000 for the Cherish food program - this works out to be about 25 cents per child per day for food - not much even in Kenya
- provision of shelving in their library - \$500
- replacement of their (shabby) text books (one only per class) - \$1,000
- perhaps a little bit of solar lighting \$200.





For Kivuli and the local community

•supply and installation of LED lights, 12 volt battery and solar panel, for 10 homes without electric lighting and with students trying to study at night. Isaac has things planned for us.

A Letter to the Congregation

Dear Friends,

Sadness fills our hearts as we attempt to accept the news that Glenn Laub is no longer with us. Glenn was a brave man who never complained and bore his suffering silently. He never questioned 'Why me?' He courageously lived his life as a role model to all who knew him. Sue, Andrew, Tim and David must be proud to have a husband and father of Glenn's stature. Sue has been courageous as she has supported Glenn every step of the way. Each one of us will recall treasured memories of Glen. Personally, I especially remember Glenn when he was the father of a prep student at Glen Waverley Primary School. I remember watching Glenn's beautiful smile as he walked with Sue and his little boys. Glenn's absolute trust in God permeated every aspect of his life. Glenn had both faith and hope in God. This passage from Genesis reminds us that it is in moments of suffering and darkness that we encounter God. God's opening words are powerful words of comfort and reassurance: 'Do not be afraid ... I am your shield.' (Genesis 15:1-2)

Recently Ross and I reviewed a paper by Rev Sally Douglas titled 'Being the Church.' She poses the question: 'What are we here for?' She eloquently says that a 'painful gift of being Church in the 21st century is that assumptions about the Church, its purpose and identity, are no longer valid.' She goes on to say that 'the Church is given the rare opportunity to examine the rubble and excavate to foundations to discern what is core to being church ... For this investigation to be authentic then those who remain the Church are invited to engage afresh with our sacred texts, to reflect on the ways Jesus communities were living.' (December 2015, Australian Journal of Mission Studies, Volume 9 Number 2 page 40.) The final paragraph (18) of the Basis of Union prays for this difficult examination:

The Uniting Church prays that, through the gift of the Spirit, God will constantly correct that which is erroneous in its life, will bring it into deeper unity with other Churches, and will use its worship, witness and service to God's eternal glory through Jesus Christ the Lord. Amen.

May we know the touch of Your hand, O Christ.

From the Community Outreach Missional Group

Kerry Children Bible Ministry led by Pastor William have three key areas of work in Ponda Mali, Kenya. They offer a feeding program for approximately 200 children. They also support children's education and they have programs supporting woman.

The mission of the organisation is -

"Our Mission is to raise children full of hope and a better future in society. We build the capacities of the vulnerable so they may work towards a positive future."

In recent years, including 2015, Kerry Children Bible Ministry received COP funding support for their meal program for children. They appreciated our support and members of our church have visited the project. An application for COP funding for 2016 was not submitted. There has never been an intention to create dependency on our funding. We also recognise that there is sometimes a time or season for projects like this.



The Community Outreach Committee became aware that Pastor William was anxious about managing the transition time and continuing to feed the children. Neil consulted some of those involved in the past and Community Outreach considered a one off contribution to assist in this transition period.

What is the purpose of a Congregational Meeting and the role of the Chairperson?

Congregational meeting provide an opportunity for a congregation to both appoint or change certain office bearers and placements, and to be informed of the work of the Church Council as per regulations.

Church Council is responsible for the day to day operation of a congregation as representatives of the congregation.

It is only when there are changes being made to a Church Council structure or specific problems within the community that a Congregational Meeting may sometimes become involved in Church Council matters.

Specifically, UCA regulations make the following statements.

The Uniting Church regulations specify the purpose, frequency and tasks of a Congregational meeting.

Under Section 3.1.1 (c) of the regulations (http://www.victas.uca.org.au/aboutus/Documents/Regulations.pdf) say a congregation responsibilities include:-

- (i) participating in shared responsibilities with any related Congregations;
- (ii) fulfilling the ministry of the Church in and to the community;
- (iii) appointing Elders and other members of the Church Council, and members of other bodies, as required; (See Reg. 3.3.2)
- (iv) appointing member(s) to the Presbytery; (See Reg. 3.3.4)
- (v) making arrangements to call a Minister in accordance with the Regulations; (See Reg. 2.6.6)
- (vi) providing facilities and resources in support of the work of the Congregation, including stipends and allowances and other provisions for the support of the ministry, provided that stipends shall be the first charge on the funds of the Congregation;
- (vii) meeting as required to transact business that belongs to the Congregation;
- (viii) advising the Church Council on property matters affecting the Congregation;
- (ix) maintaining all necessary and appropriate relationships with the Presbytery and other councils and bodies;
- (x) such other things as are consistent with the purposes of the Church and not the specific responsibility of any other council or body within the Church.

The regulations also require the following:-

Meetings of the Congregation

3.5.1 Participation in the meeting of the Congregation

- (a) The following persons shall be entitled to participate in the decision phase at meetings of the Congregation, (referred to in this Regulation as voting members):
 - (i) all Ministers, Pastors, Youth Workers and Lay Pastors who hold membership in the Congregation;
 - (ii) all other confirmed members of the Congregation;
 - (iii) all members-in-association with the Congregation;
 - (iv) all Ministers, Pastors, Youth Workers and Lay Pastors serving in approved placements in the Congregation.

Adherents and members not yet confirmed may participate in discussion but not in the determination of any item of business at the meetings.

Chairperson and Secretary

(b) The meeting of a Congregation shall appoint a chairperson and a secretary. They shall hold office for periods determined by the Congregation. If the elected chairperson or secretary is not present at a meeting, the Congregation may appoint another of its members to act as chairperson or secretary.

General meetings

- (c) (i) General meetings of the Congregation shall be held at least twice in each year and shall be convened by the chairperson and secretary or, if there is a vacancy in one of those positions, by the remaining officer:
 - (ii) At least once each year at a meeting of the Congregation, financial reports shall be presented and policies, plans, budgets, appointments and other matters within the responsibility of the Congregation shall be determined.

Special Meetings

- (d) (i) The chairperson and secretary of the Congregation may convene a special meeting, due notice being given, and shall do so if requested in writing by at least seven members eligible to vote or a number representing at least 10% of the members eligible to vote, whichever is the greater, of the Congregation. A special meeting shall deal only with matters specified in the notice of meeting.
 - (ii) If, in in the opinion of the Pastoral Relations Committee of the Presbytery, circumstances warrant, the chairperson of the Presbytery or the chairperson's nominee may convene a general or special meeting of the Congregation.

Notice of Meetings

(e) Due notice of all meetings shall be given at least one week prior to the date of the meeting, either by public announcement at a time of public announcement at a time of public worship or by such other means as the Congregation may determine.

So what does that all mean for us?

Glen Waverley Uniting Church Congregational meetings are held to enable members of the congregation to carry out their responsibilities under the regulations.

These specifically include the appointment of elders and church councillors, receiving and approving annual budgets, reviewing actual financial outcomes, making arrangements to call a placement (Minster/Pastor etc) and for us, approving the Congregational Outreach Program recipients (COP) as well as being made aware of what is happening in the life of the congregation.

This is why we have a minimum of 3 meetings per year, as we need to select COP recipients mid year to enable the fete committee to do its work, we have an end of year meeting to set budgets, and a beginning of year meeting to review the previous year. At any one of those meetings, or at another special meeting, we also receive business that needs the congregation input - for example - making arrangements to call a placement.

Chairperson

The role of chairperson of a congregation therefore has a specific set of tasks.

The role is to ensure that the congregation exercises its responsibilities as per the regulations:- and

The role manages the business of the meeting. But that is all.

If you feel you know someone who would like to do that role, or you feel you would like to make that contribution, please nominate for the position.
