The Christian Church in the World Battle Christian prisoners in captivity at Christmas

For most Christians, Christmas is a season of immense joy. For Christians separated from loved ones and fellow believers due to incarceration or captivity, it can be particularly painful. Christians are incarcerated in Algeria, Burma, China, Eritrea, Indonesia, Iran, North Korea, Pakistan, Tajikistan, Turkey, Vietnam and possibly elsewhere. Christians are also being held captive by Islamic jihadists in Mali. Some are pastors and evangelists and some are 'prophetic voices' of righteousness, whilst others are simply pawns in a much larger game. Whatever the cause of their incarceration or captivity, we cannot overestimate the ferocity of the spiritual and emotional struggle taking place within these prisoners' souls. Traumatised, isolated and condemned to harsh and often dehumanising conditions designed to break the spirit, Christian prisoners need our prayers!

Persian convert in Iran to stay in jail

In May last year, Persian convert to Christianity, Naser Navard Gol-Tapeh and three Azerbaijanis were sentenced to ten years in jail for 'missionary activities' and 'conducting activities against national security'. They were deemed guilty of propagating house churches and promoting 'Zionist Christianity'. The Christians were derided as making 'foolish claims'. Whilst the Azerbaijanis were permitted to return home after posting bail, Naser Navard Gol-Tapeh (an Iranian national) was sent to prison. The verdicts were appealed, but on 12 November an Iranian court upheld all four 10-year sentences. Naser will remain in prison where he is liable to be treated harshly with physical punishment. Please pray for Naser, for Iran and for all of Iran's Christian prisoners.

Leisure Time Success at Pinewood Pitch

In late 2017, Leisure Time applied for a donation through the Pinewood Pitch Community Grant Program. This is an initiative of the Pinewood branch of the Bendigo Bank in collaboration with other community Pitch Partners. It was decided to aim for an item of equipment which would benefit both the Leisure Time guests and the whole congregation, so after consulting with the Property Committee, a Hearing Loop for Room 1 became our goal.

Cliff Baker drafted an excellent application, which led to us being short-listed by the bank. We were then asked to attend a training session which outlined how to prepare and maximise the outcomes of a Pitch for funds from the Pitch Partners. It was all a bit razzamatazz for our committee but we soldiered on valiantly and prepared our display and handouts for the night at the Mulgrave Country Club. Warren Greenwood did a great job with the up-front "pitch" to the audience of about 500 people, and was ably supported by Leisure Time committee members.

The final result was a resounding success. The Bendigo Bank donated \$1200 (plus GST) and the Pitch Partners very generously committed a further \$1000 on the night.

The total cost of the Hearing Loop is \$2600, so Leisure Time provided the balance to make this new equipment possible for our hearing impaired members and visitors.

Well done to all involved.

Exciting News - Commonwealth Grant Round 3 Opportunity

I have some exciting news to share with all of you.

Back in late July 2017 we were invited by MP Julian Hill (who you may recall has had several visits to GWUC for a variety of functions) to submit an application for a Commonwealth Grant under their "Stronger Communities Programme" that would assist us in continuing and/or expanding our community work.

The grant conditions are very specific, limited, and had a very short time frame for us to respond.

Julian and his team were allocated a total of \$150,000 to spread in his entire electorate, and two, of many, key conditions were that we would have to fund 50% or more of the project ourselves, and that it be completed prior to June 2018. They also wish to have the MP's office involved with its commissioning as they are to gain local reporting on the grant outcomes.

With Church Council, Finance Committee and others we looked and discussed with as many of the congregation key team, Leisure Time and others, as to what projects we would want to consider.

Although there were a number of options ranging from a Mini Bus and electric BBQs through to miscellaneous equipment, none of these items had been previously researched or sufficiently costed to be able to submit them.

Property Committee has for some time costed the replacing of Worship Centre ceiling heating with an efficient inverter air-conditioning option to provide better heating in winter (as the current heating is a 28 year old ceiling based unit that is very expensive to operate) and to also provide summer cooling. We currently only have the 4 small ceiling fans.

We believed the A/C was needed going forward both for our community groups that use the facility as well as our own congregation members. We have lost bookings that could help pay for these new options, due to the lack of adequate heating and cooling.

The project was estimated to have a total cost of approximately \$33,000, and so, with Church Council, Finance Committee and the Treasurer's support and approval (that we could proceed with the project if we received any substantial grant by using our deferred maintenance funds) we submitted the project to the MP's office mid August 2017.

I am really pleased to advise that Julian Hill has recommended to the Commonwealth Grants Office that we should receive \$12,000 of the \$16,000 we applied for, towards this project. It was very much a "first in best dressed" process.

Julian had over \$500,000 of applications for the \$150,000 he could recommend. Therefore our recommended share is spectacular!

The key reasons for Julian Hill's support for our request were:-

- From his various visits to GWUC, he could see that we were actively working with the local community in a number of ways such as the HUB, Playgroups, English classes, Probus, Mini Maestro's, Leisure Time etc.
- That although we were a *Faith based organisation*, we allowed community groups to use all our facilities for these activities: and
- That we were known in the local community for our welfare support, receive referrals from Monash Council, the Library and many others through our work with PALs, Seniors Week as well as our fund raising events for Cancer Council, MND, the fete and much more.

This is a tremendous encouragement and compliment to the whole congregation for their work in looking to and working towards our mission.

Many of the other applicants were not open to community access of their facilities or had not developed a community plan, and wanted to wait until funding was provided, whereas we were already reaching into the community and doing this work.

Julian and his committee liked and were impressed that we did not wait for others, we just got on with it.

Once again, the time frames to complete the final documentation to receive this grant were very short and the office manager of Julian Hill's electorate recommended we have our final application during the week commencing 11th September, which would, in his words, *almost ensure* we will receive the funds.

A decision to spend \$20,000 or more of our *Deferred Maintenance* funds was discussed and supported at the last Congregational meeting, but the office manager of Julian Hill's electorate suggested we complete the application, while having this conversation with our congregation.

We have received confirmation of the \$12,000 grant (Jan 2018), which is spectacular, and in accordance with the above story, the project will proceed immediately. Due to the significant additions to our switchboard needed to support this installation, we are also taking the opportunity to upgrade our switchboard with a global "earth leakage protection" feature, as recommended by Synod and Presbytery Safe Church and Property procedures.

The congregation needs to be congratulated that our efforts to engage with the community have been witnessed by others and supported by this substantial grant.
