The Christian Church in the World

Rebels vow to march on Bangui in Central African Republic (CAR)

Since mid-April, at least three Islamic militias have been regrouping in CAR's north-east, mostly in and around the rebel-held front-line town of Kaga Bandoro with the stated aim of launching an attack on the capital, Bangui. On 13 May two French Mirage fighter jets conducted a show of force over Kaga Bandoro hoping to deter the militants. UN peacekeepers and CAR Armed Forces are on high alert, determined to prevent any militia movement southwards towards the capital. On 15-16 May armed Muslims invaded Bambari, shattering a year-long period of UN-supervised peace. Numerous properties, organisations and institutions, including the local church, were looted and sacked; eight people were killed and tens of thousands displaced. Tensions are soaring. Please pray for a breakthrough in CAR and for the suffering Church.

Leaders in Ethiopia and Eritrea have opened the door of peace

Eritrea is one of the world's most dangerous places for Christians; thousands have suffered imprisonment. Its brutal dictator, Isaias Afwerki has long used the pretext of 'the Ethiopian threat' to legitimise his cruel, despotic, totalitarian rule. On 5 June Ethiopia's Prime Minister, Dr Abiy Ahmed (41) - a Protestant Christian convert from Islam - offered to accept the border ruling of 2002 pursuant to peace. Aware that peace with Ethiopia would de-legitimise his dictatorship, Afwerki is treading cautiously. On 26 June an Eritrean delegation arrived in Ethiopia for the first high-level meeting in 20 years. It appears to have been extremely positive. It has since been confirmed that PM Abiy and President Afwerki will meet 'soon'. For the sake of the long-suffering, severely persecuted Eritrean Church, please pray!

And you wrestle with and share deep stories together, but sometimes the mat is damaged but you weave it and you put it back together. That was the real take away message and my experience of the Assembly because it was a heavy assembly and some of the issues that we were looking at were issues that people held really strong views for. Just seeing that commitment to all be sitting equally on a mat and to wrestle it out together was pretty powerful.

Q. That's an amazing point to end: thank you.

We did have a number of international guests... that was interesting to hear what those people were thinking about...and many of them were wrestling with the consensus model and issues because that was quite new to a number of them. It was interesting to hear those voices whose experience was positive and not dissimilar to my experience in North Sulawesi as well where people are all struggling with church in the 21st century and church no longer being in the centre of all the decision making in community life or struggling to find its voice...

Q. Did you feel that the UCA is in touch with cutting edge issues in the region?

... I feel quite proud that the UCA wanted to make a statement on domestic violence and that one of the comments was that sometimes religion, including our own Christian faith has been used as a way to allow domestic violence. It doesn't make it right, but we acknowledge that sometimes the whole submission idea is that you must submit, you can't leave... So to acknowledge that in a statement is really strong and powerful but where does that statement go? Who picks that up and how do you communicate that?...we do have our agencies...

Q. What about the ages and the backgrounds of the delegates...what did that tell you about the Uniting Church in Australia?

Assembly was ... in my memory...like there were pockets of diversity in terms of people from different ethnicities and cultures but probably predominantly it reflected more of an Anglo Celtic Australian background...maybe there were more men?...there was a strong youth/ younger contingent and that had been encouraged and it's part of the Assembly stuff that you do to have a strong representation of young people to allow them to learn how assembly works. Obviously like any big meeting like that there's lots to learn and to understand about how you might ever get the courage to go to the mic and make a statement...so there's definitely a process for younger people.

Q. Were there any take away messages or insights to apply or share with GWUC?

Yea... from the Bible studies; the Bible studies at Assembly were just fantastic...they talked about the Tongan and Fijian and Samoan, I think way of *telanoa*: it's the idea that you put out your mat (and we've got one on the wall of our church from Tonga) and you invite people onto the mat. The process of *telanoa* is that you share deep stories in life together. Then they chatted about how not only do you sit on the mat .. and enter into each other's world but ... you also have times when you need to repair the mat. And you can't do that by yourself: it's a community process to weave the mat together. It was such a good visual picture of how the Uniting Church is so committed to trying to work...on an even playing field, like this lovely mat that **everyone** is welcome to sit on and the whole point is that you offer some hospitality on the mat and hospitality is offered back to you.

Q. That's impressive. Were there any individuals whom you met who left a lasting impression on you, without necessarily naming them?

The dedication that some people had who had maybe been to 3 or 4 assemblies ...to putting in the energy and the effort to be on top of all the reports and to be part of some of the sub committees; people on the assembly standing committee ...that was pretty impressive.

Also I really appreciated being amongst people from different places. So I remember when some of the environmental stuff was being discussed, over lunch having a discussion with someone who was just sharing about rural and farming life in Australia. And how the environmental impact of the statement that was being brought out did not perhaps reflect rural farmers because some of the farming community--and I've got family who are farmers, so I believe this to be quite true -- are very environmental in some of the ways they operate. So it's a little bit funny for them to read a statement from the city ...telling them how to be like environmental. So some of those conversations I thought were awesome because they reminded me that it's really important to make statements and to be pro things and to want advocacy..., but it's also important to remember that there are always people who are already doing this stuff. There are also people who are really affected. For example, to say that mining is bad might be something that many people agree with, but in communities where mining is their source of income and livelihood it's not as easy as that... so holding those tensions together...really stood out.

Q. How did your visit to north Sulawesi earlier in the year affect your view of the Assembly and the issues it dealt with?

...there are a couple of ways that it shaped my view. One way was sometimes people were getting up and saying ecumenical voices don't believe in this and this and this. For instance, with the marriage issue, one of the thought processes and debates was if we say we are pro marriage equality, as a church community, that means our ecumenical brothers and sisters won't want to be a part of our faith, or our unity any more; maybe they won't ever want to unify and if the Uniting Church is wanting to become a unified body of Christ...with whatever denominations might want to join us, then that's going to make that gap even bigger.

Q. Are you speaking within Australia about other denominations or are you thinking internationally?

Well they were kind of saying both. They were saying our international partners are more conservative...and won't want anything to do with us if this is the way we go forward....But my experience in the Asian Ecumenical Youth Assembly was actually the opposite. Everyone was struggling with these kinds of issues and everyone was struggling with how to be an accepting church community to all people including LBTGI+Q people...

Interview with Alanee Hearnshaw about the 15th Assembly of the UCA by Glyn Howells

Q. Al I understand it was your first Assembly: was there anything about the experience overall that struck you in particular?

I think because it was my first Assembly it was quite interesting to see the wider church with people not just from the Synod of Victoria and Tasmania who may have similar opinions on things ... or are more in the know maybe. It was really amazing to see the breadth and diversity from all around Australia with people coming together with their passion for the Uniting Church.

Q. Were there any issues that you felt were particularly significant?

I think I found myself mentioning to people when they asked about assembly that from my perspective it was a heavy assembly. And I did chat to someone who had been to a lot of assemblies. I asked are they usually like this? And they said "no". So that was relief and that was because we looked at the issues of domestic violence that is going on in Australia and there was a report and a statement put before the assembly on that. And that was the first order of business. Then we had the report from the Royal Commission which is also really heavy. And then ...we were looking at the definition of marriage within the Uniting Church and that's a really heavy decision for people as well. Then there was a small proposal that ended up being quite a large discussion ... about voluntary assisted dying because of the new legislation in Victoria....

Q. What lasting impression of the UCA did you come away with because you mentioned that you saw the breadth and the diversity? Where did that leave you feeling about the wider church?

I felt really... I'm not sure what the right word is...whether it's "impressed" or "warm" ... but that's using silly "card language". I was really impressed by the way that as a governing body Assembly were really happy to struggle and wrestle with the differences of opinion and the diversity...That even though some of those conversations were actually quite hard people really wanted to honour what other people's opinions were and where they were coming from. People understood the idea that we are a people that are on the way together; so that you cannot really walk along together if our constitution is that we are a pilgrim people on a journey; you can't really stop being on that journey just because you disagree. So seeing the consensus kind of majority and the consensus decisions and people kind of going "Well, this is my opinion, but I understand that this is not where everyone else is at. So I'm actually happy for the decision to be made but I'm going to sit over here and hope that I understand it later". So there was some real graciousness in that and some real commitment in wrestling with those things together.

What kind of community do we envisage in the future for Glen Waverley Uniting Church? What values should we aspire to? What are our dreams for it?

What are the challenges of building a community? What changes do you think we will have to accommodate? How will we deal with the possibility of changes that see the demise of much-loved traditions or practices? Will these changes have an impact on our faith? How would we cope with that?

The Uniting Church in Australia regulations indicate that a vote can only be held at a Congregational Meeting and that absentee and postal voting is not permitted.

Ballot papers will ONLY be handed out at those services. They will not be available at other times during the day.

Nominees receiving the support of a majority of those participating in the ballot will be declared to be elected.

In accordance with the congregational decision of July 2013, all Church Councillors will be elected as Elders as well as Councillors.

Nomination Forms

These will be available on **Sunday 22 July 2018** and at any time after that date from the office or office counter **until Sunday 12 August 2018** when nominations will close. Everyone in the congregation is encouraged to carefully consider accepting nomination and to make nominations.

Each nomination requires:-

- a Proposer and Seconder
- a Nominee
- signatures of Proposer, Seconder and Nominee
- the Nominee is requested to provide some personal information to assist our decision-making.

Nominations close on Sunday 12 August, 2018.

The nomination forms may be returned to the Church Office until the end of that date.
