Christian family persecuted in Iran

On 11 July Ramiel Bet Tamraz, an ethnic Assyrian, was sentenced to four months' jail, charged with 'propaganda against the state by attending house churches'. Ramiel's mother, Shamiram Isavi Khabizeh, and father, Pastor Victor Bet Tamraz, are currently appealing against their five- and ten-year prison terms on charges of 'acting against national security'. In Iran, ethnic Assyrians are normally allowed to practise their Christianity quietly without reference to the Persian majority. The 'crime' of this Assyrian family is that they witness to and worship with ethnic Persians, who, despite being born Muslim, are freely turning to Christ in unprecedented numbers. Ramiel's lawyer will appeal for the sentence to be reduced or cancelled. Please pray for this intensively persecuted family and for the Church and its outreach in Iran.

Sword of weaponised Islam revealed in Indonesia

In September 2016 Islamists prevented Ahok - a popular ethnic Chinese Christian - from being elected Governor of Jakarta. First they warned Muslims against voting for him (citing the Koran); then they used a trumped-up charge of blasphemy to destroy him. Today, as Ahok serves his two-year prison term, every potential leader is aware this 'sword of Islam' hangs over their head. On 17 April 2019 Indonesia will hold its first presidential election of the 'post-Ahok era'. To protect himself, President Joko Widodo has chosen a fundamentalist Islamic cleric as his running mate. Ma'ruf Amin is not only one of Indonesia's most influential clerics but, as chairman of the Indonesian Ulema Council, he signed the fatwa that destroyed Ahok. These are pivotal days. Please pray for Indonesia and its Christians.



Who is my family?

Over the past two weeks we have had many tributes given in celebration of the lives of those who have recently died. I have been able to attend two funerals of members of our congregation and have been moved by what family have said about their loved ones.

It made me reflect on the question who is my family. As a migrant from the UK I left all of my family when I travelled to Australia to start a new beginning with my husband David. Now 38 years later, not only have I become part of David's family, we have grown our nuclear family to include two children and three grandchildren.

A definition of family could be nuclear, extended, single parent, reconstituted or even childless. Family also crosses bloodlines, with groups forming strong bonds that would normally be associated with blood relatives. Certainly, many migrants survive loneliness by making strong friendships through those they associate with.

Then there are the family bonds that have been stretched through distance, argument or some other dysfunctional problem. The photo above is of my mother's brothers, Albert and Gerald. I can only physically catch up with them when visiting the UK and when we meet it is as if we have never been apart. Such is the bond of love.

Questions about family bonds and spiritual bonds are brought to mind by the words of Jesus. You may recall when he was talking in a home, such was the intensity of the visit, Jesus had not been given the opportunity to rest or eat. In the middle of all of this, his family, concerned about his welfare, came to 'rescue' him from this situation. So when Jesus was told that his family was outside and were calling for him (Matt 12:45-46) his curt reply was that the ones he pointed to within the home were his family. We also have the words of how Jesus came to divide father against son, mother against daughter (Luke 12:51-53).

While some may think Jesus treated his family badly and was divisive with regard to families, I believe reading behind the text we know that Jesus tried to unify communities through the preaching of peace and forgiveness. So how do we compare these texts with his philosophy of family?
