The Christian Church in the World

The battle for Idlib heats up in Syria

Idlib Governorate in Syria's north-west, bordering Turkey, is the last major rebel stronghold in Syria. Syria cannot allow Idlib to remain a terror sanctuary from where missiles are perpetually launched into civilian centres. On 6 May the Syrian Army launched an offensive to drive the jihadists back and end the shelling of civilian centres. On 12 May rebel missiles fired from Idlib struck Al-Suqaylabiyah, a Greek Orthodox Christian city in northern Hama. Five children playing together were killed instantly while a woman was killed nearby; eight were wounded. The next day, one civilian was killed and seven wounded when the jihadists shelled Al-Suqaylabiyah again. Jihadists are also threatening western Aleppo and northern Latakia, home for many Christians yearning for peace and security. Please pray for Syria and its Church. *from Religious Liberty Prayer Bulletin*

Christian Crisis in Eritrea

President Afwerki has long used the 'Ethiopian threat' as a pretext to justify his repressive dictatorship and indefinite military service. Consequently, when Ethiopia and Eritrea brokered peace in July 2018, many hoped human rights would improve. Today, however, Eritrea's human rights remain among the worst in the world and Eritreans continue to flee en masse. To prevent protests as the nation prepared to celebrate Independence Day (24 May), the regime deployed police and soldiers to the streets of Asmara and raided several Protestant groups. On 10 May 141 Christians, including 14 minors, were arrested as they gathered in north-east Asmara; 50 were subsequently released. A further 30 Christians were arrested on 17 May in gatherings in south-west Asmara. Conditions in detention are horrendous; torture is routine. Please pray for Eritrea and its Christians. *from Religious Liberty Prayer Bulletin*

The deepest companionship with Christ is forged not in the moments of ecstasy when a new and marvellous experience fills us with overflowing joy, but is found in those hours of suffering and hardship when we realise that He makes good His word: "I am with you always, even unto the end of the world". (Matthew 28:20) God's love for sinners is in the action of Christ who died for us. It seems that goodness is often a prey to evil and that wrong seems to eclipse right, but God always has the last word. Jesus submitted to death, but by the cross He cancelled forever the power of evil. (see Luke 9 and I Corinthians I:18-31)

Why the You Yangs are an inspiration to me:

The name "You Yangs" is derived from local Aboriginal words and means "big mountain in the middle of a plain" and there are three main granite peaks that rise up from flat volcanic plains near Corio Bay, around which the city of Geelong is situated.

For me, the You Yangs have always had a Trinitarian aspect, alongside the concept of the hills of Zion that surrounded Jerusalem, to which the pilgrims gazed in hope and anticipation as they journeyed to their religious festivals. In Jerusalem, they experienced their pivotal worship experiences which strengthened them and their faith in God, but which had to last them for unknown lengths of time.

As we meditate on the Psalms, we are spiritually nurtured to help us understand that "...*His purpose in all of this was that the nations should seek after God and perhaps feel their way toward him and find him - though he is not far from any one of us. For in him we live and move and exist...*" (Acts 17: 27-28a); until the next moments of meditation and prayer.

Psalm 121 is always part of my meditations every time I look to the You Yangs: "I look up to the mountains - does my help come from there? My help comes from the Lord, who made the heavens and the earth!"

I am always reminded that although the "hills/mountains" were places of refuge in times of struggle, ultimately my help has always come from God.

Joan Stott is a member of the Uniting Church in Australia with a deep love of the Psalms. These magnificent poems have inspired and consoled people of many faiths and no faith for thousands of years. For some time now, Joan has taken the psalm listed in the weekly lectionary and has written about it on her website appropriately entitled "The Timeless Psalms". Our minister, Neil Peters, just happens to be Joan's nephew and he tells me that she is no longer adding to her website, but that is of no matter, as the website is still open and contains a wealth of very helpful material.

Joan has always had a deep involvement with the Church, locally, nationally and internationally, first as a Methodist and now in the Uniting Church. Her biography on her website is inspirational, especially as much of what she has achieved has been while suffering ill-health.

In dealing with the Psalms, Joan usually follows this pattern for each psalm:

1.A call to worship based in the psalm chosen,

2.A copy of the psalm - usually the New Living Translation,

3.Prayers based on the psalm -these can be thanksgiving, trust, petition, praise, etc, depending on the theme of the psalm in question, and

4.A personal meditation - the psalms are personal poems and lend themselves to personal devotion and meditation.

Joan lives in Geelong and I was particularly taken with some of Joan's comments on Psalm 121.
