Ministry Team Reports

Rev Ian Ferguson

- Minister of the Word and Team Leader

Overview - This past year has been a profound journey of recovery, reflection, and reconnection. Following my heart attack early in 2024, I have re-entered ministry gently and deliberately, supported by the grace of God and the compassion of the Glen Waverley congregation. I have been challenged to model my way on Jesus the wounded healer—one who does not minister from a place of invulnerability, but from shared humanity, from scars, from pain transformed into compassion.

This image has guided me as I've rebuilt capacity, returned to preaching and pastoral leadership, and walked with others in their grief, hope, and questioning. In my frailty, I have discovered again the strength of God's call–persistent, tender, and ever renewing.

Health - As I have healed from my cardiac trauma and grappled with the chronic pain of ankylosing spondylitis, I have experienced both limits and grace. I have needed to change the way I work to allow for increased tiredness and to give myself a protective buffer from stress and exhaustion – I am not much good in night meetings any more! I am grateful

that by February 2025, my health had stabilised and strengthened to the point that I no longer needed to offer routine updates to Church Council.

Worship Leadership - Throughout the year, worship has remained the heart of my call. I returned to preaching after Easter, entering a sustainable rhythm with Chris of alternating reflections and liturgical leadership. Together with the newly formed Worship Oversight Group, we have worked to shape worship that is both grounded in the traditions and open to creative possibilities.

The Worship Time Review affirmed our congregation's desire for a single 10am service. This review celebrated the shared leadership between Chris and myself and highlighted the community's longing for spiritual depth, musical diversity, and authentic participation in worship. These values align deeply with my own sense of call: to create spaces where people encounter the living Christ in community through word, song, silence, and story.

Pastoral and Community Care - I resumed pastoral visiting as energy allowed, and have been privileged to accompany people through joy and sorrow. I conducted multiple funerals, including for members I was only just coming to know–each a sacred moment of community and remembrance.

Ministry Team Reports

In these acts of care, I have felt again the call of Christ in my vulnerability to hold space, offer prayer, and trust the Spirit's quiet work.

Missional Engagement - I continue to engage with the broader community through The Hub, English classes, multicultural celebrations, and interfaith events. These connections have helped me re-embed into the relational and missional life of Glen Waverley, and I find joy in the conversations and creativity these spaces offer.

Strategic Leadership - I began engaging actively with our four strategic projects: Welfare Review, Multicultural and Intergenerational Engagement, Online Ministry Development, Local Community Outreach. These initiatives represent our congregation's desire to respond to God's call not just in worship, but in service, innovation, and inclusion. I see these as opportunities to offer leadership that is theologically reflective, collaborative, and grounded in our shared vision.

Conclusion - This has been a year of recovery—but also a year of revelation. I have heard again the call of Jesus, in the stillness of illness, in the fragility of body, in the companionship of others who know suffering. As I step forward into the next year of ministry, I do so with renewed clarity: to offer what I can, from who I am, trusting that in God's grace even brokenness can become blessing.

Rev Chris Waddell

- Minister of the Word for First Third of Life

It's hard to believe another year has passed at Glen Waverley Uniting Church! This second year as an ordained minister here has been full of joy, learning, and many more "firsts" to celebrate. I continue to feel blessed by the love and support of this congregation and by the ways we see God at work in our church and community.

Some of the highlights for me this year have been the vibrant Easter season, our growing youth and family ministries, and the creative outreach happening through our programs. Easter was a particularly meaningful time, as we explored the Passion narrative in engaging and reflective ways through our worship. It was wonderful to see so many people moved and challenged by the services we shared together.

We also launched our first Easter holiday program, which was a great success, welcoming over 40 children, most from outside our congregation. It was a joy to see our young teenagers volunteering to help, and the feedback from families was overwhelmingly positive. We're excited to follow this up with more school holiday programs in the future.

Our youth ministries continue to grow in exciting ways. The weekly youth group has thrived, and our new Sunday morning teen Bible study has been a wonderful space for discussion,

prayer, and connection. The Sunday squad is a highlight for out kids, and it is great to see kids rush out to learn more about God.

Other memorable moments this year included our successful trivia night fundraiser, our continued presence serving pancakes at the high school each week, and the steady growth of our badminton and table tennis ministry, which now draws people of all ages and backgrounds. These ministries remind me how deeply this church values sharing the gospel through welcome, care, and community.

As we look ahead, I'm excited for all that God is continuing to do in and through us. Thank you for letting me share in this journey with you—I look forward to what lies ahead as we keep growing and learning together.

- Pastoral Care

It has been a joy to continue sharing in Ministry at Glen Waverley UC with Rev Ian and Rev Chris and Joanne. There has been quite a bit of visiting with people in hospital, nursing homes and rehab. We have had a number of Funerals and I have been involved in leading some of these services, or sharing in these services, a very special honour. I have also done a few funerals in the Black Rock area and also a number of people not associated with the Church.

I am looking forward to going to Canada in May this year to catch up with family and to meet my new Grandson and reconnect with his big brother.

I am on the World Day of Prayer Vic. Committee as the Uniting Church Rep, I am on the MLDC Committee for Presbytery where I am involved in mentoring Lay Preacher and Lay Pastor Candidates, I am also on the Ministry Formation Committee. I walk with the GOWERS at Jells, meet with GOMER, I attend Team Meetings, Inclusive Community meetings, UCA, Leisure Time as a helper/driver, Aqua Fish and Code of Ethics Training. I have been leading Worship at Strathdon with 2 services a month. I will finish my time there at the end of March 2025. I have enjoyed sharing with the oldies, but I leave them in the hands of a new Full Time Chaplain. It has also been good to assist with the Fete and the Book Sale.

We also have a number of Fundraising Morning teas to support a number of Charities. I have Supervision and I meet with a Minister Support Group.

It has been a busy year at Black Rock as Charman Uniting Church. It was exciting to have our progress in coming together, feature in Crosslight. The renovations on the Church Building are coming along slowly and we hope to be in the new building, in Cheltenham, by Christmas 2025.

Each year, all the church groups are asked to write an annual report for Church Council. These reports are shared here. Together, they paint a picture of an active congregation. You may be surprised to see that so much is happening.

Adult Group

The Adult Group meet for lunch on the first Friday of the Month. There is no minimum or maximum age limit – everyone is welcome.

The aims of the group are broadly:

- to provide a friendly place of contact in congenial surroundings, with activities centred on items of mutual interest.
- to be used as an avenue for newcomers to get to know church folk.
- to assist generally with church activities, eg. fetes, working bees, etc.

Badminton & Table Tennis

An enthusiastic group of social badminton players meet in the hall from 8pm until 10pm on Monday and Thursday nights. Table tennis is also available. Open to anyone who would like to play.

Highlights of the Year...

Growth in player numbers and resurgence of table tennis. Four tables up most nights and a wait list for badminton. This means that we are very financial and contributed \$3000 to the floor resurfacing which looks and feels fantastic in the past 12 months. We are a very friendly and welcoming group. Many have limited English but lots of translations take place.



Broadcast Ministry

The Broadcast Ministry group:

- provides broadcast facilities for worship services to a global audience;
- records and creates DVD's for distribution to Glen Waverley Uniting Church members and other interested parties;
- creates and supports an in-home and hospital ministry
- records significant worship and other events; and
- provides technical assistance to both the Ministry team and other worship space users.

Highlights of the Year...

- Weekly worships continue to be viewed and supported by over 180 to 250 logins weekly. It needs to be remembered that at each login there can be between 1 and 35 people watching so potentially the true viewing numbers can be as high as 500 people. As well as congregations near and far away, many of our own members, shut-ins or just persons having a rest, still enjoy logging into the services each week rather than attending. They have told us they still feel a part of the congregation when they do that. There are usually 40 to 50 logins (50 to 100 people) watching live each Sunday.
- There are now over 461 people (a further 25% increase globally on 2023 numbers) who have "Subscribed" to this ministry on YouTube and our website, and who receive an automatic email whenever we are streaming any worship or service.
- Funerals and other special events live streaming provides great support for families with members unable to get to the event, and the wider community, with these services being viewed local/interstate/overseas.
- The professional and supportive participation of the Ministry team in this outreach. It has been hard for them to engage with members of the congregation through a camera, but they have been wonderful in trying. Not all of the leaders of worship have understood these challenges, but the broadcast team have worked with them and continue to try and "make them look good" as the saying goes.
- We get a great deal of feedback of appreciation from many people on how they enjoy the worship options. Members of the Broadcast Team feel very privileged and focused on this ministry as we hear from congregational members how supportive and helpful they find the live streams.

- A Christmas end of year celebration at Code Five funded by the performance fee we received singing at the Multicultural Christmas Celebration.

- 8. liaise with Property Committee and make use of, and manage, any external signage:
- 9. take advantage of free promotional media wherever possible (i.e. Real Estate boards);
- 10. publicise and communicate Presbytery and Synod activities and events; and
- 11. encourage, support and assist all forms of communications in Glen Waverley Uniting Church.

Craft Group



Highlights of the Year...

- •In 2024 we booked tables at the Hub special morning teas. The students enjoyed these sessions as they could converse with other students and contribute to table discussions, on set topics.
- <u>RevlanFerguson</u> and <u>RevChrisWaddell</u> joined us, in terms 3 and 4, taking a session each.
- •Our helper, Lina, who speaks Mandarin, helps students, during the lessons, taking a small group and translating when it is necessary. She messages the students, during the week.
- Rosters and topics are prepared by the convenor, each term. One tutor, one helper and Lina are rostered on each week. Tutors are free to change the topics.
- The students are very enthusiastic and keen to develop their skills.
- We try to break into three groups, every lesson, so that students get to know each other better and have more practice speaking in a smaller group

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee is a sub-committee of the Church Council. The Finance Committee works to ensure that information about the life of the congregation is compiled and communicated effectively. That members of the congregation know what is going on in terms of all financial information required for the effective running of the Church.

The Finance Committee maintains all financial records in terms of required accounting practices. The Finance Committee oversees the audit processes (external) completed annually.

Specifically, the Finance Committee's role is to:

- 1. oversee and coordinate all Finance documents and materials across the congregation ensuring that they are done in a timely and inclusive manner;
- 2. introduce new methods of finance management and process as appropriate, eg, change to using Xero in 2022 and the presentation of a Monthly Executive summary using a suite of Management Reports throughout 2023;
- 3. facilitate the production of a Budget and then Financial Accounts in a variety of formats (to bring the congregation together through the use of information and management reporting);
- 4. ensure that all church finance communications are clear, appropriate and that no bias or offensive content is present and that all assumptions are readily explained;
- 5. continue to develop our Finance automation using Xero in 2023 and 2024 and improving our process and authorities;
- 6. maintain all records of funds received and expenses incurred in appropriate formats as used by Glen Waverley Uniting Church;
- 7. seek to make best use of Standard accounting methodologies to present material to publicise our financial accounting position to all parties within the Glen Waverley Uniting Church community using current methodology;
- 8. liaise with Property Committee and make use of, and manage, any external rental activities and ensure these are recorded and managed effectively;
- 9. take advantage of all available information to present our Accounts and financial information for Audit in a timely fashion and ensure external Audit is finalised by mid-Year;
- 10. publicise and communicate Presbytery and Synod directives and activities and events in relation to Finance activities; and
- 11. encourage, support and assist all forms of Finance Committee communications across Glen Waverley Uniting Church.

Highlights of the Year...

- The Finance Budget and expenditure Items were approved and we ended with a sound and strong financial result for 2024. We have transferred funds to assist in rebuilding our Deferred Maintenance Reserve.
- Ideas for Changes to process our financial Accounts and activities format have been reviewed and were implemented in 2024 and updated again in Mid-2024.
- Treasurer confirmed for further 2 years from January 1 2024 in Dec 2024.
- Implemented a Standardised monthly Executive Suite of Reports.

Highlights of the Year...

- We receive reports from our sub-committees-bereavement support, prayer support, supportive care link, cradle roll convenor, pastoral care convenor, roll maintenance representative, seniors' ministry and leisure time representative. These reports are discussed and action is taken, if necessary.
- The Convenor has continued to prepare the sunflower welcomers roster using door stewards and other volunteers. One person is rostered on each week.
- When service times changed from 9.15am and 11am to 10am, it became more difficult to serve light lunches so these were discontinued.
- Munch with a Bunch was also discontinued in 2024. It was difficult to find a venue close by that would provide lunch for a reasonable price. Catering for lunch at the church was also costly and it was difficult to find enough volunteers to prepare, serve, set up and clean up. The group of 35-50 people who had attended Munch with a Bunch previously had diminished (moved into care, passed away or not able to attend because of medical issues) so we decided to discontinue this activity.
- Special morning teas have been held for Mother's Day, Father's Day, special occasions for Ministry Team or church members, the Uniting Church Anniversary and other significant events.
- There is good communication and co-operation within the committee.

Leisure Time

Leisure Time is a community outreach project of the Uniting Church Glen Waverley and is established for the principal objective of providing services for elderly and housebound people

Highlights of the Year...

- This program proves to be most successful due to its volunteers. The
 program received a Monash PALS activity grant of \$250 and a gold
 coin donation from the guests. This covers the costs of the
 afternoon tea which consists of sandwiches and slices made or
 purchased each month, and a Christmas present at the last
 meeting.
- All guests complete a registration form. All volunteers complete an annual form of availability which is used to make the yearly roster.
 All guests and volunteers register on the day which fulfils a health and safety check such as in an emergency evacuation we know who is present and can be accounted for, or, if a guest or volunteer is not present a welfare call can be made.
- The program starts with the consumption of the afternoon tea, then announcements an activity such as a quiz, and the recognition of birthdays for that month with a cake and photograph. The Christmas afternoon tea is open to the spouses of our volunteers and a gift is given to all those in attendance.
- A Newsletter is circulated every two months with articles and what's on at the church. My thanks to Joanne who is very gifted in producing this newsletter and Alison Clarkson who is the Newsletter Editor.
- The activity themes of each month are agreed by the Leisure Time Small Group that meet in the January before the program starts in February. Sometimes a small item is given in keeping with the theme, such as the bookmark and tassel (made by the craft group) for Anzac Day. In November we invited the 'Treble Tones' to lead in songs from WW1 and WW2 to honour Remembrance Day.
- This is a strong program that has been in existence for many years albeit changing to meet the demands of guests and volunteer availability. In December we said farewell to a most loved and loyal volunteer, <u>BarbaraThompson</u> who retired after many years of service.
- Due to rising costs, it has been proposed that the guests offer a \$5 donation.

Outreach and Social Justice Mission Group

Encourages our congregation to be active and committed to serving God in the wider community and around the world.

Supports existing and ongoing projects, e.g. Congregational Outreach Projects, and to considers new concerns raised by the congregation or the Justice and International Mission unit of the UCA.

Highlights of the Year...

COP projects

- The major effort for 2024 was the re-establishment of the Congregational Outreach Projects (COP) procedures and congregational engagement.
- A COP Sunday service and lunch was held in May in collaboration with the ministry team and speakers from 3 previously supported COP projects.
- Applications were received, and five projects were carefully selected to be recipients of the 2024 fete proceeds.
- The COP projects were well supported by the congregation and proceeds of \$21,701.49 were distributed to the projects by late November. Sincere letters of appreciation have been received from all COP recipients.

Other highlights

- Improvement of our communication efforts with the congregation, using noticeboard, weekly Bulletin and Kingsway.
- Other ongoing projects, e.g. monthly Material Aid appeals, Honey Money, Pancake Breakfasts at GW Secondary College, continue to provide care to our wider community. We also undertook promotion of special and seasonal appeals.
- We have begun to participate in local First Nations activities and have established a relationship with the Aboriginal Partnerships office at Monash Council.
- We introduced a knitting project to supply handknitted items to Knit One Give One (KOGO) for distribution to vulnerable and disadvantaged persons. 132 items were made by congregation members and others.
- We provide an intentional connecting point for all GWUC outreach and social justice projects and thus a link to Church Council.

Highlights of the Year...

- A page introducing the theme of the meditation is sent by email in preparation of the forthcoming session. Some of our themes have been taken from the Psalms, Lectionary, significant current events, etc. The meditation is for 30 minutes. We use breathing and relaxation techniques to quieten our minds and body to become receptive to talking with, listening to, or just sitting with God. We finish the meditation with a written prayer in keeping with the theme. Before the close, a prayer holding others before God is said.
- The meditation group is open to members of the congregation and the wider community. Before covid we met at the church, and then switched to zoom. The pros are that those able to use zoom technology can meet from the comfort of their homes or wider afield (we have one member who is often in WA). The cons are that computer skills are not always available.
- A proposal for 2025 is to return to the church for face to face meetings, as well as have meditation on zoom. This would mean having face to face meditation plus on line meditation simultaneously.

Playgroup Volunteers

Provides an ongoing meeting time and place for young children to learn to socialise, play and participate with some organised activities with other children of similar age, and their carers to socialise with other adults as often they are newcomers to area.

Highlights of the Year...

A highlight for the year was watching their ongoing development, both children and carers. Highlights of the Year...

- An important year re forward staffing and planning re our staffing mix and fit for the forthcoming 3-4 years with arrival of the 2 new Ministerial team members.
- Met with Rev Chris Waddell and initial communication with Rev Ian Ferguson in late 2023 and then upon his arrival. Subsequent health issues impacted Ian's involvement.
- Completed of extension of contract for Di Paterson and change to Pastor position designation in early 2020 and then renegotiation of Di Paterson's contract in December 2022 and recently in December 2023 for 2024.
- Managed employment and performance issues for Church Council in terms of our contracts and legal obligations under employment law and awards.
- Reviewed and updated of Office Manager role and Hours and agreement through Church Council and further extension for another 3 year (from April 2024) with no further salary increment.
- Recruitment process completed with John and Tess and a successful appointment finalised with commencement in September 2023 and agreement to 12-month extension post probation to December 2024.
 A successful outcome although Ray (Ramoun) resigned in late December 2024, effective 28 February 2025.
- Reviewed Office Hours and confirmed current arrangements with Joanne in late November 2023 and again in 2024.
- Updated processes and review of our Annual Leave processes and the availing and planning of A/L for 2023 with detailed reporting process successfully implemented.
- Need to review LSL for Di Paterson in Feb 2024
- Agreement of Office Hours and Staffing over Christmas / New Year December 2024 with Joanne availing of 3 weeks leave.
- Creation of Provision for LSL (annual basis) Funds accrued for Di Paterson
- Had intended to maintain Office Manual as a working document for GWUC processes. This still requires updating (to be updated after conversion to Xero) delayed again until March / April 2025.
- Maintained our Employment contracts and Personal Records securely.
- Managed our salary and allowances records and reporting to Synod P & C and via award reviews and correspondence from Centralised Stipend Payment Service (CSPS)
- Have had extensive dealings with Synod Payroll CSPS (Michelle Ennis).

Property Committee

Maintains, expands and cares for the Property/s used by the Glen Waverley Uniting Church for the benefit of all of the congregation and act as a stewardship caretaker for those properties on behalf of the Uniting Church in Australia.

Generate income from the property in a manner that is consistent with the UCA and Glen Waverley Uniting Church philosophies.

Highlights of the Year...

- A very large exercise was undertaken over many months to outline GWUC's intended actions to fulfil Synod's requirement that "... all sections of the UCA Victoria and Tasmania were to aim for zero emissions by 2040.". Warren Greenwood organised a project team which produced a recommendation report which Church Council approved in September. A brief presentation was given at the November congregational meeting, outlining:
 - the list of approved projects,
 - the agreement by Church Council for Head of Property & Treasurer to be the ones agreeing on the timing for each project based on funding available
 - that the programme of work will be reviewed at least every 12 months to ensure it evolves as technology does
 - that this is a long-term programme of work that will be undertaken in a very measured and fiscally responsible manner
 - the general approach of "do not replace items that are not broken"
- On 17th November, a massive downpour and associated flooding affected the Glen Waverley Uniting Church tennis club basically destroying 2 courts and left two more unplayable until repaired. The team continues to work with club officials, Synod & insurance assessors to have the quotations finalised, approved and the repairs underway.
- One of the challenges for 2024 was the closure of the multiple-story carpark and the stress that placed on our own carpark. This was managed exceptionally well by the attending groups, by people being considerate of those less mobile than themselves (and therefore parking elsewhere), and by a general understanding that this was just for a short period and would resolve in 2025.
- Rentals have continued to assist with GWUC's financial position, though we note the loss of Mini Maestros has left a bit of a hole (franchisee retiring from business). As a result, the rentals have only just covered all normal property costs, maintenance etc during the year.
- The way which all members of the GWUC community and hirers respected our buildings and facilities which led to lower-thanexpected maintenance.
- Two new microphones were purchased for our ministers to use each Sunday, and both are working very well.
- Office multifunction printer arrangement was renewed with a new printer contracted for several years at a lower cost.
- A few significant rain events throughout 2024 showed some areas of the church where minor leakage occurred. Those that could be addressed were, and others are noted for future action.
- Manse maintenance has been aligned with budget, though the replacement of the hot water service in #15 Southdown was unexpected. It did, however, tick off one of the Emissions Management Projects' actions. Robert also did an excellent job in fixing the awkward walkway near the back gate of #17.
- Warren continues to provide oversight to the Security, Essential Services Testing and Monash Council and Presbytery returns in those areas.
- All AESMR testing for 2024 passed inspection and results were sent to Synod/Monash council and recorded onsite for inspection as required.
- Early January 2025, the Hall floor was 'revitalised' and the funding for this was largely provided by a donation from the Badminton group. The work was highly successful, and the property committee would like to sincerely thank the whole congregation for studiously avoiding the Hall whilst the new floor was drying.
- The whole property team has been outstanding throughout 2024 in managing their individual responsibilities and pitching in elsewhere when required. Warren (manse maintenance, broadcast & major project coordination), Neil (broadcast, maintenance & electrical testing), Robert (day-to-day maintenance activities), Fairlie (rosters), Mirini (church and manses gardens), and Joel (broadcast/AV & general maintenance) do an amazing job.

Finance Committee Report

Management Report to Church Council and Congregation for the YEAR ENDED 31 December 2024 | UCA - Glen Waverley | ABN 33 086 862 203

Overview - GWUC A Difficult Year

The P&L for 31 December attached reflects a deficit of \$39,643.15 against a planned surplus of \$6,800. This is a variance of \$46,443 and is in line with our guidance and predictions over the last several months. However, we would like you to concentrate on the Operating deficit / Cash flow deficit for 2024 of \$21,995.

Following completion of the year ending items we have finalised our Accounts and now completed the Management Accounts and the Management Reports. We will seek both Finance committee, Church Council approval, and submit the Financial Accounts to Yates Partners for Audit in mid-March 2025.

We are satisfied with the accuracy and technical proficiency of our Set of Accounts. We provide the following comments and rationale for the Deficit.

We budgeted for our offerings to reflect higher levels, we have experienced lower receipts because less people are contributing as a consequence of the number departing and/or no longer contributing:

Over the 12 months our offering is approximately 7.00% below a plan that had been adjusted down after the prior year (post Covid). We failed to meet our budget.

We know we have a broader giving issue and with our demographics and are likely to see further reductions as our numbers of givers reduces and we lose more of the older group through a variety of circumstances. We are working on these issues, but we have failed to replace those leaving with new arrivals and those who appear to have joined are not contributing to the same levels as those older long-established groups who are now departing.

Reduced Actual Rental Income.

We achieved Rental Income of \$68,210 against an aggressive plan of \$80,000. Variance of \$11,790.

There are other items of lesser consequence, and you can review these in the attached Management Reports in early February. Consequently, our Revenue is behind where we projected to be, and we see no immediate means of adjusting. Our rental income is near its maximum. We have an ageing congregation with less numbers attending.

Expenditure.

The most significant area remains our overall cost structure being applied to deliver the programmes and framework desired and approved by Church Council. Let me explain simply and in greater Detail.

Our Total Expenses were \$500,345 against a plan / budget of \$471,100. At a time when our receipts (primarily our giving) are falling our expenses were \$29,245 above the planned total of \$471,100. Our Staff Costs after the annual adjustment's advice from Synod and through Award changes, were above plan.

In simple terms our revenue was down, but these issues were identified and expected. Expenses are tightly controlled, but our total Staffing costs, particularly our Ministers Stipends and Allowances, were above our planned figure, and we did not plan (my fault) for the increase in Superannuation levy across all our staff.

Summary.

We have finalised our Financial Accounts for 2024. The Operating Cash Deficit will reflect a figure of \$21,995, which is reflective of our commentary over the last 4 months. We created accruals in our Balance Sheet for our unexpended Welfare Receipts by creating an Accrual Account in the Balance Sheet of \$17,647.79. That will increase our Total Deficit for 2024 to \$39,643.15 although our Operating Deficit will be \$21,995.

In late January / February 2025 we will bring these Accruals back from the Balance Sheet into our Receipts for 2025, which will then be for Welfare Expenditure and Henry Shaw expenditure through our Welfare team. We will clear the Accrual from the Balance Sheet in February 2025.

There is nothing new here, but it summarizes what has been reported in Management Reports over the last year, especially recent months to Church Council from Finance Committee.

Our income and receipts are falling by 1-2% annually, while expenses are rising by 4%.

This trend is unsustainable. We can sustain these deficits for another year or two before Finance Committee raises concerns about our diminishing reserves created by previous leadership and ministerial teams. By 2026/2027, auditors may also express concerns.

Simply put, we are operating, in financial terms, beyond our means.
