## Glimpses of the annual retreat to the Strathbogie Ranges

#### Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and everyone shall see it. Isaiah 40.5

Why did some Indonesian cultures already have a deep connection to Biblical stories and themes? In Indonesian culture, how does the diner indicate politely s/he has finished?

Neither the pre-Christmas flurry of work and end of year celebrations, no internet, ODI cricket, injured ankles nor forecast gale force winds ... not even the ghost of Melbourne's ring of steel could deter four fearless travellers from arriving in good spirits at the post COVID first fling of the

Swanpool cinema's big opening night. In pouring rain, typical of the north east, they did not linger for the second film or even choc tops, let alone supper. It was the first weekend in December.

Four cars had become one before

they set off after work, arriving in time for dinner. Deep in the depths of the distant Lima East valley neither rain nor sunshine, dark looming hills nor unfamiliar bush tracks stopped them. Soon they braved the heat of the slow combustion stove, the irregularity of mud bricks, the unforgiving coldness of slate floors. Simple pancakes, Polish dumplings and finer fare from the far-flung Indonesian archipelago accompanied anecdotes from Poland, Guangzhou, West Papua, Kalimantan, North Sulawesi, Java and

Barwon Heads. Spear fishing and boating misadventures in West Papua, stingrays at Phillip Island, sculpture, white ants, welding, a grandfather who was a blacksmith, family tragedies, an aunt who had a bakery and why some cultures already had a deep



connection to Biblical stories and themes: these were highlights in conversation about hospitality, fire bunkers, citizen's science, ancient aquaculture in south west Victoria, contrasting rice growing cultures in Indonesia and first people's caring for country through fire management.

We climbed the hill to visit Shaun the local sculptor, stone mason, builder, welder, orchardist and apiarist; we came away with warm hearts and blue gum and kunzia honey. Then it was work time. The other side of summer we look forward to a good crop of feijoas now that many hands have made light work of netting the flowering bushes before the resident bower birds got amongst them. We had shared fellowship in many ways and finally in a sunny break overlooking the brimming creek, we shared our concerns for people and situations near and far, prayed in turn, sang and worshipped together amid a chorus of frogs... glimpses of the annual retreat to the Strathbogie Ranges.

## **Update** - Audio Visual Setup in our Worship Area

Our audio visual setup started with a small screen mounted above the organ 33 years ago, eventually moving to a ceiling mounted Data Projector and large wall screen around 15 years ago.

We have had great value and service from this equipment and more recently, with our online worship capabilities that it has also supported.

Since 2015/16, Property and the Broadcast team developed a 3 stage plan to upgrade all the church equipment to digital as and when possible. Digital allows greater flexibility, quality of sound and picture as well as longevity of service.

Current technology has all moved to digital and so sourcing replacement parts or expanding our existing system has become difficult and expensive.

**Stage 1** Convert some of the broadcast capability and the hearing loops to digital (completed in 2017) Thanks to a generous bequest. Installing diversified audio controls that deliver a flexible recording capability (completed 2019).

**Stage 2 Part 1** (*Early 2020*) Convert the Data Projector and screen to multiple large screen LED TVs, wall mounted, removing the need for frequent hoists to change globes, clean filters and servicing that gives quality viewing and longevity of features.

We cannot afford to do this upgrade in one

go, so during lockdown we started by adding one large screen (86inch) TV to the south wall above the choir and organ.

**Stage 2 Part 2** (*Late 2020/Early 2021*) Install the second LED TV above the band area and replace the screen, removing the need for the roof mounted data projector.

To just replace the existing Data Projector with a digital option would cost an unacceptable \$9,000 to \$10,000 and still require us to borrow a hoist to service it regularly.

The LED TV's are designed to last for 8 to 10 years. Something the Data Projectors could never offer us. So, as we come out of lockdown you will see the new TV screens, with the significantly clearer technology, on our worship centre walls.

Although no longer suitable for the worship centre, the data projector will not be wasted, as we will be able to use it in other areas of the complex (at ground level where easily serviced) for meetings and other functions.

These new digital screen TV's are amazing and are now being installed in almost all new churches. Data Projectors are no longer first choice because they are too expensive and have too much maintenance requirements.

Our challenge then is our transition, not the technology.



**Stage 3** Replace the remaining audio setup (cabling, sound mixer and microphones) with modern digital equipment to give us another 20 years. Everything we have been doing over the past 5 years has been moving towards this same overall plan. If resources become available earlier, through a bequest, donation or subsidy, then the final stage may happen earlier.
