

CONGREGATIONAL OUTREACH PROJECTS (COP) IN 2024

It's time to start planning for COP2024.

Our annual church fete raises substantial funds through the generous and faithful work of our whole congregation. These funds are then distributed to projects which benefit people outside of our own congregation through our Congregational Outreach Projects.

■ This year, the newly re-formed Outreach & Social Justice Mission Group, with the approval of Church Council, has simplified and updated the Congregational Outreach Project selection process.

Members of the congregation are warmly invited to propose projects which they feel are worthy of our fete funds and which meet the GWUC assessment criteria. Applications for local, national and international** projects are all eligible.

The assessment criteria and process will be similar to those applied previously.

Applications will open on 2 April and close on 26 May

In recent years, the congregation has found it difficult to appoint a Congregational Outreach Project selection committee. From 2024, the COP Selection Panel will be drawn from those members of the Outreach and Social Justice Mission Group without involvement or connection with any of the submitted projects. In practice, this has been happening for some years.

The COP selection panel will assess applications and have recommendations ready to present to the congregation by early July. These recommendations will be presented to a

meeting of the congregation in July or August. In the event that there are insufficient suitable congregational outreach project applications from the congregation, the selection panel will be permitted to recommend one or more Uniting Church of Australia Outreach services (e.g. UnitingWorld, Frontier Services, our local welfare program) which meet Glen Waverley Uniting Church selection criteria.

They support the Church in meeting the External Conduct Standards set by the Australian Charities Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) and ensure that any international activities and giving goes to reputable organisations, maximising the impact that it may have for the intended recipients.

Pacific Island Ministry

Many of you will remember Glen Waverley Uniting Church supporting financially the Kiribati community (a south pacific island) that enabled them to purchase Birthing Kits that were distributed at no cost to them, that has saved many lives of women and girls in the remote atolls. This project was initiated by members of our partner church at Johnstonville - Wendy and Peter Flahive https://www.bkfa.org.au/kiribati-pilot-project/ - and was a COP recipient mentored by Bobbie Rooks. Over 200 kits were wrapped, packed, transported and distributed, and 12 women were trained to help these women use the kits. It was a wonderful and practical outreach.



The team is extending this outreach in 2024

and plan to provide the same Birthing Kits now to women and girls of the **Solomon Islands**. This project requires them to raise \$4,000 for the kits **prior to June 2024** and it will again be managed and overseen by the Birthing Kit Association (Aust). It is an exciting extension to the successful original project.

Unfortunately, the timing of our Fete and COP outcomes does not meet the urgent need of the project for these funds, and so Church Council has approved placing this request before you now. Church Council Secretary - David Morgan has verified that this group is a valid registered charity.

When donating, it is important to indicate that the funds are for **the Pilot Project in the Solomon Islands - June 2024.** If you have any problems, please give them a call.

Unfortunately, funds cannot be processed via the GWUC Church Office.

Thank you for considering this important project that we know will help save the lives of mothers and babies in some very remote communities where they have no trained mid-wives.

A tale from... the Children's Court

Sunday

I was very aware of Rev Chris's theme on Sunday 25 February about How do we serve God? I had been especially focused on this message as I had been writing the Prayers of the People for the 11am service in the days before Sunday. By the next morning my Monday routine of attending the Children's Court in the city had overtaken Sunday's focus.

Monday

I am a volunteer with the Court Network. This role involves speaking to people involved in the court proceedings who sit in the waiting area for their cases to be heard.

We networkers provide a listening ear, simple information about the court and the offer of something to drink. We have a filing cabinet drawer filled with giant tins of instant coffee and milo plus boxes of teabags along with packets of long life milk and sachets of sugar. Given that court users often wait for several hours to be called into court, our hot drinks and cups of cold water are a staple of our role.

This Monday I made my usual offer of coffee etc to one young woman in the waiting area. She was disheveled and the smell around her indicated she was in urgent need of a wash and her clothes likewise. She accepted a coffee: white with four sugars.

I returned shortly after with a paper cup of hot sweet coffee. I did not have an opportunity to speak to her because a number of legal people came up to speak with her so I quickly withdrew. (We volunteers know our place.)

Much, much, later, as I was leaving the court a formally dressed woman stopped me and thanked me for giving this young client a cup of coffee. She went on to explain that the "mum" had initiated this court action for the return of her baby because her child had been taken from her at birth by Child Protection staff. But because the mum was drug addicted and had never actually taken care of the baby, it was extremely unlikely the magistrate would allow the little one to be given into her care.

It seemed the legal representatives from both sides, the Child Protection unit and the woman in front of me (who was from Legal Aid) had talked to the mum at length about the impasse. Eventually it had become apparent that the mum realised the magistrate would not agree to her application for the return of her child but her actual motivation for the request was to provide factual evidence to her child (in the future) that she had fought for her or him.

I was emotionally confronted at this enormity.

When the matter had come before the court the magistrate was understanding, finding that even though the child would not be placed in her care, the written outcome would emphasise the mother's love for her child and her desire to undertake care.

The legal woman in front of me said simply "I am going to give my kids an extra kiss tonight."

Tuesday

The next morning brought the thought: "even a cup of cold water" (Matthew 10:42). In 2024 even a paper cup of sweet instant coffee may help - a little.






One of our Friday Group who cannot be with us this year gave us each a copy of the book Leaving Alexandria. It is a brilliant book by a man who have experienced Christian faith in many forms. It is well worth reading if only to help us contemplate our faith.

Born in 1933, Richard Holloway grew up in a nominally Christian family in Alexandria near Glasgow, at an early age he became involved in the local Anglican church and developed a strong faith built around the rites and practices of the Anglican church. At the tender age of 14 he was selected to train as an Anglican monk in a monastery in England. The book opens with him visiting the cemetery of the now closed monastery and reminiscing over the graves of his old tutors, long past all having lived their single, celibate lives second thoughts, then marrying and within the sacred walls with the firm finally finding the joys of marriage and conviction that marriage showed a weakness. Email Safety

Email is a great way for us to keep in touch, and it is widely used within our congregation. However, there are villains out there who abuse our trusting nature. Recently, some members of the congregation have received scam messages, apparently, but not really, from people they know and trust.

Did you know that the sender of email is not necessarily the person or organisation named at the top of an email?

Did you know that if you reply to an email, it will not necessarily go to the person you think it will?

Did you know that a common way of defrauding people is to convince them to click on an unsafe link in an email or text message?

Here are some simple things you can do to protect yourself.

- 1. If an email apparently from someone you know seems a bit strange, don't trust it. Ring them up and check (but don't use a phone number in the email; find their phone number some other way).
- 2. If you are not expecting an email from someone, don't click on a link in the email.
- 3. Similarly, don't click on links in SMS messages.
- 4. If an email out of the blue asks you to send money or gift cards, don't; it's almost certainly a scam.
- 5. Turn on, or enable, two-factor authentication on your email account; in fact on all accounts you have for services delivered over the internet. If you need help, your internet service provider such as Telstra can help if you contact their help or customer service people.
