VALE ALAN MATHESON



How does one aptly condense a multifaceted Alan into a bite-sized portrait?

Never pretentious, underneath his quiet demeanor Alan was a force to be reckoned with. That was not surprising as, apart from his insatiable reading and his countless contacts keeping him well abreast of national and global thinking on contemporary issues, justice and righteousness were his springboard. They grounded his concern for

the marginalised and excluded – First Nations Peoples, workers, migrants, refugees, or others suffering from unfair decisions.

Alan was active in several arenas, but I knew him in the context of the church and ecumenism. "Churches acting together" in the spirit of the Lund Principle, one sidelined in recent decades, informed his Christian outlook. For three decades he was a spark in the life of the Australian Council of Churches and the early National Council of Churches in Australia - especially through World Christian Action and Christian World Service Commissions, predecessors to Act for Peace. At the institutional level, or at the personal level, he sought what was right. After my serious eye injury during a visit to Ethiopia to meet Christmas Bowl partners, he pursued the higher ups relentlessly to ensure a proper response on my return.

Alan was devoted to the Victorian Council of Churches. How often have we seen him upstanding or with a finger in the air to persuade the gathered assembly? But Alan was 'no fly in fly out' ecumenist. He participated in and enriched group meetings, all the time quietly reflecting as he developed his elaborate artistic doodles! His love for the VCC mirrored his self-understanding as a proud Victorian.

An ordained Minister, Alan was proud of his Churches of Christ, and its ecumenical roots, which influenced some of his interventions, that at times would displease some. He was a longstanding member of the Church of Christ in Surrey Hills, where he worshipped, preached, joined in fellowship, counselled, and was farewelled.


Alan was passionate about what he believed, arguing vigorously, as the Apostles might have done 2,000 years ago. A humanist shaped by his work at CURA, EMC, WCC and the ACTU, he was impelled by the vision of a better church and world. He remained loyal and connected with his vast army of friends, most of whom experiencing his warmth, dry humour, mentoring in some cases, all the while exploring "where did it go wrong" and how to "fix it" over a cup of his beloved coffee or a glass of red. Occasionally he would call friends for failing to live up to the highest principles, always out of love, never vindictively. He loved Barbara, Leigh and Debra and their families intensely. But woe betide anyone who faulted his Hawks!

Alan leaves an unmistakable void. The world and the church are the poorer with his passing. Alan RIP.

Victorian Council of Churches welcomes New Bishops to our Assyrian and Greek Churches

Assyrian



His Holiness Mar Awa III Royel; Catholicos-Patriarch of the Assyrian Church of the East Biography

His Holiness Mar Awa III Royel, 122nd Catholicos-Patriarch of the Assyrian Church of the East, was born on 4 July 1975. His participa tion in the ecclesiastical life of the Church began at the young age of 16, when he was ordained as a sub-deacon. He then assumed the rank of deacon the following year in 1992 at St George's Cathedral in Chicago. These ordinations were both conducted by the late His Holiness Mar Dinkha IV of blessed memory.

On 3 May 1999, he was ordained a priest and on 30 November 2008, Mar Awa III was consecrated as bishop by Mar Dinkha IV at Mar Zaia Cathedral in Modesto, California. He also served as the secretary of the Holy Synod of the Assyrian Church of the East from the year 2015. Additionally, under his leadership as bishop, the St Isaac of Nineveh monastery, presently being the only active monastery in the Assyrian Church of the East, was established by Mar Awa in California, with the tonsuring and clothing of two monks. Upon the formal resignation of His Holiness Mar Gewargis III Catholicos-Patriarch, Mar Awa Royel was elected to become the 122nd Catholicos-Patriarch of the Assyrian Church of the East by the members of the Holy Synod on 8 September 2021. His patriarchal enthronement took place on the Feast of the Holy Cross in St John the Baptist Cathedral in Erbil, Iraq on 13 September 2021, making him the first Western-born patriarch of the Assyrian Church of the East.

He has received a number of academic accreditations, completing his bachelor of Arts degree majoring in Theology with a minor in Philosophy from Loyola University in 1997 and obtained a second bachelor degree in Sacred theology from the University of St Mary of the Lake in 1999. He then graduated with a Licentiate in Sacred Theology in 2001 and received his Doctorate of Sacred Theology in Eastern Liturgy in 2008, both from the Pontifical Oriental Institute in Rome.

He has also been an active advocate for Assyrian indigenous rights and freedom of religion, raising awareness to the plight of persecuted Assyrian Christians during the invasion of the Islamic State in Iraq and its surrounding regions. Notably, he spoke at the inaugural In Defence of Christians Summit in Washington DC in September 2014. Additionally, Mar Awa, alongside His Grace Mar Paulus Benjamin, provided a briefing to Ben Rhodes, Deputy National Security Advisor for Strategic Communications, concerning the dire situations persecuted Christian minorities were facing in Iraq and Syria – bringing to light the Khabour river attack by the Islamic State, where over 200 Assyrian Christians were held hostage. This meeting achieved important outcomes for the Assyrian community, leading to the condemnation by Rhodes of systematic attacks on religious minorities by the terror organisation and a plan by the Administration to protect and help impacted civilians.

A further honourable achievement by the novel patriarch includes the publication entitled *Mysteries* of the Kingdom: The Sacraments of the Assyrian Church of the East – a theological catechistical treatise on the seven sacraments of the Assyrian Church of the East

During the first part of the year we had to postpone training due to the impact of COVID-19 and some training was moved to online. We have made some attempts at face to face however restrictions keep getting in the way.

We are planning on running one on Thursday the 14th of October for Basic Training/Refresher training in Psychological First Aid and Emotional Spiritual Care. 9am-3pm

The training course is a 2 stage process involving;

- Self-paced learning and completion of the workbook. This material must be completed at least 5 days prior to attending the training day.
- Face to Face Zoom Training day This day utilises multi learning opportunities including teaching, discussion and personal reflection along with role playing / scenarios to enable the trainee to assimilate the information and understand the context, roles, responsibilities and processes involved.
 - A Short Face to Face physical session when Covid guidelines allow in the Melbourne Metro area or Yarra Ranges area subject to attendee locations.
- Completion of the workbook and attendance at the training are essential prerequisites for application for registration with VCC Emergencies Ministry. Successful registration will require the completion of safety checks including a National Criminal History Check, WWCC and referee reports and will occur after the training has been completed.



LAUNCH OF NEW INITIATIVE IN PHILIPINES

ECUMENICAL NETWORK FOR PEACE AND HUMAN RIGHTS IN THE PHILIPPINES (EcuNet PHRP) 30 August 2021

We in the ECUMENICAL NETWORK FOR PEACE AND HUMAN RIGHTS IN THE PHILIPPINES (EcuNet PHRP) act in solidarity with our fellow church workers, justice and peace advocates, and the majority of the Filipino people who are suffering injustice in its various forms. We are a network of church people from the various churches, denominations, church organizations and institutions working together in the advocacy of human rights, justice and peace in the Philippines.

The Spirit of God invites us to see the signs of the times and act in faith to turn 'khaos' (crisis) into 'kairos' (opportune time for positive transformation). The Gospel commissions us to be "...salt of the earth and light of the world." (Matthew 5:13-16). The foundations of our respective churches and faith traditions set us on the path to respond in our present situations to act in defense of human rights and continue to walk the way of justice and peace.

The World Council of Churches 10th Assembly calls its member churches to pursue the **Way of Just Peace**: "We reaffirm the Ecumenical Call to Just Peace which states 'While life in God's hands is irrepressible, peace does not yet reign. The principalities and powers, though not sovereign, still enjoy their victories, and we will be restless and broken until peace prevails. Peacemakers will speak against and speak for, tear down and build up, lament and celebrate, grieve and rejoice. Until our longing joins our belonging in the consummation of all things in God, the work of peace will continue as the flickering of sure grace."

Catholic Social Teaching also calls the faithful to defend human rights: "Human rights are to be defended not only individually but also as a whole: protecting them only partially would imply a kind of failure to recognize them. They correspond to the demands of human dignity and entail, in the first place, the fulfilment of the essential needs of the person in the material and spiritual spheres." (Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church, n. 154.) We defend human rights in the spirit of solidarity and subsidiarity.

To live our evangelical mission, we shall endeavour to continue updating ourselves on human rights situations in the Philippines and deepen our understanding of the root causes of injustices and human rights violations through webinars and other online platforms, and small group reflection sessions. We shall link up with ecumenical circles and churches in the Philippines that advocate and share the same mission on justice and peace. We shall issue statements on human rights and peace advocacy for the Philippines. We will engage with Australian and international political bodies to advance justice and peace advocacy for the Philippines. We will work with likeminded civic organizations in Australia to advance our cause. Through personal prayer and community services and liturgies we will highlight our commitment to justice and peace in the Philippines.

The Jerusalem Declaration on Antisemitism



This important new document has emerged that aims to present a comprehensive description and understanding of what antisemitism is and is not. The Jerusalem Declaration is largely in response to the inadequacies and misuse of the Working Definition of anti-semitism of the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA), which has been adopted by many countries as the standard definition.

As this new declaration points out however, "The IHRA Definition" (including its "examples") is neither clear nor coherent. Whatever the intentions of its proponents, it blurs the difference between antisemitic speech and legitimate criticism of Israel and Zionism. This causes confusion, while delegitimizing the voices of Palestinians and others, including Jews, who hold views that are sharply critical of Israel and Zionism."

"The Jerusalem Declaration on Antisemitism is a tool to identify, confront and raise awareness about antisemitism as it manifests in countries around the world today. It includes a <u>preamble</u>, <u>definition</u>, and a set of 15 <u>guidelines</u> that provide detailed guidance for those seeking to recognize antisemitism in order to craft responses. It was developed by a group of scholars in the fields of Holocaust history, Jewish studies, and Middle East studies to meet what has become a


