A Letter to the Congregation

Dear Friends,

By now I expect that you may have had the opportunity to use the sacred space adjoining the church vestry. Maybe you were looking for a quiet place to pray or meditate in solitude. Another idea is to gather in the sacred space with some friends for small group prayers or meditation. These might be based on a passage of scripture or an inspiring poem or passage. The group might pray for one of its members going through a time of sorrow or joy using short, simple prayers, direct, honest, authentic, sincere and from the heart. Silent prayers are fine too. Someone may guide the prayer but let the Holy Spirit lead. I believe that our sacred space can be a real blessing if we use it well.

Recently I have been thinking about "trust". We would not truly understand the meaning of trust if we merely relied upon a theoretical explanation. True understanding of trust comes through lived experience. Trust has to be earned. We trust people who do what they say, who are transparently honest, who do not gossip and who live lives of integrity. Sadly, we may realise how valuable trust is because of its absence, for instance at times in our lives when we are deeply disappointed by people. Trust develops when we are with people who are authentic and consistent. Trust flourishes when a graciousness of attitude and an understanding that 'forgiveness opens the heart' are present.

In our church trust grows when our lives are both communally and personally attuned to and consistent with the Gospel. The scriptures point to the wisdom and value of trust in our relationship with God: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight." (Proverbs 3:5-6).

I pray that as members of Glen Waverley Uniting our trust in Christ will shape our lives, and continually strengthen us to truly be a congregation who embody both the integrity and faithfulness of Christ.

The Christian Church in the World

Christians Imperilled in North-east Syria:

Before Islamic State fighters raided the Assyrian villages on the Khabour River on 23 February this year, some 8000 Assyrians still lived there. Now they number less than 2000 and are dwindling rapidly. Many are displaced and taking refuge in the provincial capital. A Christian militia comprising some 450 Assyrian men has been formed to defend the remnant. Whilst they have the support of some Kurdish fighters, nobody else is helping them. Turkey has sealed the border and Islamic State fighters have besieged the Syrian border town which now hosts some 100 Assyrian families displaced from the Khabour River region. Over 200 Assyrian Christians remain in IS captivity. Please pray for the Church in Syria, whose leadership describes the situation as 'catastrophic'.

The Christian Kachin Terrorised in Burma:

Burma is ruled by a Burman-supremacist Buddhist regime that marginalises and persecutes all Burma's non-Burman and non-Buddhist peoples. Whilst the junta's long-running war against the Christian Kachin of Burma's far north is motivated by greed for the Kachins' resources, the Burmese military's extreme violence is motivated by deep-seated racial and religious hatred. In January two young Kachin women missionaries were raped and clubbed to death by Burmese soldiers in the Kachin Baptist Convention church compound in Northern Shan State where they lived. Civilians are routinely targeted - over 100,000 have fled their homes. The West turns a blind eye to the persecution to protect its economic and geo-strategic interests and to ensure Burma does not drift back into China's sphere of influence. Please pray for the Church in Burma.

Greg Linwood's Earthquake Story

"On the morning of 25 April 2015 I enjoyed pancakes and coffee for breakfast with the Nepali family who accommodates me during my frequent visits to Kathmandu. We discussed the old Audrey Hepburn movie "My Fair Lady" and watched some of the movie on YouTube. I have always loved the theme song "On the street where you live" so ironically I went off into the day with the words from one of my favourite songs on my mind.

'I have often walked down this street before, but the pavement always stayed beneath my feet before'

When the big earthquake struck around midday north-west of Kathmandu, I was toward the epicentre in Kathmandu's north-west fringe visiting a blind children's orphanage.

I leapt onto heaving earth which was flowing like an ocean swell, making it impossible for me to stand upright."

Anna Linwood, Greg's mother, has been made aware of the immediate need for tents for accommodation for all those who need accommodation since the earthquake. Due to a combination of unstable buildings (some of which have been destroyed) and the wet season on the way, there is an urgent need to help with this.

Anna will be selling goods at Glen Waverley Uniting Church on Sunday 14 June. All money collected will be processed through our church accounts and go to assist in the purchase of vital tent accommodation. Please see Anna to purchase some of her beautiful handmade goods.
